Maguiladoras are the assembly plants owned by transnational corporations which dominate the economy of the U.S.-Mexico border, employing over a million people. This heartfelt documentary tells the story of globalization from the personal perspectives of maquiladora workers who are organizing to create livable solutions to the hardships of environmental toxins, labor rights abuses, infrastructure and housing issues.

We see the long and ultimately successful campaign by local activists to require the cleanup of an abandoned battery-recycling plant and are inspired by Carmen's determination in waging a successful

legal campaign to get severance pay owed workers after Sanyo's closure of its Tijuana plant. Carmen's story is typical: a single mother of three, she earned \$6/day at Sanyo working the graveyard shift six nights a week, after which she returned home to a shack she built out of recycled garage doors, in a neighborhood with no paved streets, no sewage lines and no electricity.

Over a 6-week period, the professional producers of Maguilapolis trained a group of community-based activists to use digital video cameras. The intimate video diaries they created can provide us with keys to our common future.
